The Utah Navajo COVID-19 Relief Program receives large contribution from Navajo Nation Oil and Gas

To assist with the continuation of the Utah Navajo COVID-19 Relief Program, Navajo Nation Oil and Gas Company has presented Utah Navajo Health System with a \$25,000 check. NNOGC representative, Wynona Begay delivered the check in person to the administrative team and Halbert Pete.

The funds will be utilized to continue the program and expanding the delivery services to include water. Many on the Utah navajo reseidents reside in remote loactions without water and rely on hauling water and plastic water jugs,

NNOGC "was established as a federally chartered Section 17 Corporation under authority granted by the Navajo Nation Council and began operations in 1998. The company contributed \$1.2 million in direct and indirect payments to the Navajo Nation economy in 2013. The company supports numerous charitable organizations in the Navajo Nation and has contributed more than \$1.4 million in scholarships since 2003." - NNOGC.com
